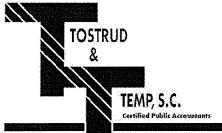

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. (a non-profit Corporation) as of June 30, 2020, and the related statements of activities, changes in net assets, functional expenses and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Reporting Entity and Nature of Business

E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. (an Iowa non-profit corporation) is organized to further the economic development of the region comprised of the Iowa Counties of Cedar, Clinton, Delaware, Dubuque and Jackson, as well as the municipalities located therein through the use of revolving loan funds. The Corporation makes available through these funds, low interest loans to supplement bank financing for projects that maintain or increase jobs in the target area. The Corporation also acts as an intermediary for loans between the Small Business Administration (SBA) and prospective small business borrowers in the same five-county region.

2. Basis of Accounting

The Corporation uses the accrual method of accounting, which recognizes income when earned and expenses when incurred.

3. Fund Accounting

In order to comply with restrictions that grantors place on grants and other gifts as well as designations made by the Board of Directors, the principles of fund accounting are used. Resources for various purposes are classified, for accounting and reporting purposes, into funds established according to their nature and purpose.

Net assets without donor restrictions are those funds presently available for use by the Corporation at the discretion of the Board of Directors. If the board were to specify a purpose where none had been stated by the original donor or grant agreement, such funds are classified as board designated net assets without donor restrictions. Net assets with donor restrictions are set aside to provide loans to eligible businesses under Revolving Loan Fund Programs in accordance with government regulations.

4. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

5. Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statements of cash flows, the Corporation considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

6. Subsequent Events

The Corporation has evaluated subsequent events through October 26, 2020, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE B - INCOME TAX STATUS

E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. qualifies as a tax-exempt Corporation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no provision has been made for federal or state income taxes.

NOTE C - CASH AND INVESTMENTS

The Corporation maintains cash balances at two financial institutions located in the Dubuque area. At June 30, 2020, \$929,194 of the Corporation's deposits were in excess of Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) coverage. There were times during the year that the Corporation's deposits exceeded the FDIC coverage and the Corporation was relying on the State Sinking Fund in accordance with Chapter 12C of the Code of Iowa. This chapter provides for additional assessments against the depositories to insure there will be no loss of public funds. The Corporation has not experienced any losses in uninsured accounts. The Corporation believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash and cash equivalents.

NOTE D - RELATED PARTY

E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. is related to the East Central Intergovernmental Association (E.C.I.A.) by virtue of its working agreement with the Association. E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. occupies office space, consumes operating supplies, and uses the management services of the East Central Intergovernmental Association. E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. is billed for such expenses through an indirect cost allocation plan retained as required by the Common Rule in the Uniform Guidance. During the year ended June 30, 2020, E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. paid E.C.I.A. \$243,354 for such services.

NOTE F - LOANS RECEIVABLE AND ALLOWANCE FOR LOAN LOSSES

Loans receivable are stated at amounts of unpaid principal reduced by an allowance for loan losses. Interest on loans is calculated by using the simple interest method on daily balances of the principal outstanding. The allowance for loan losses is established through a provision for loan losses charged to expense. Loans are charged against the allowance for loan losses when management believes that collection of the principal is unlikely. The allowance is an amount management believes will be adequate to absorb possible losses on existing loans that may become uncollectible, based upon evaluation of the loan portfolio and prior loan loss experience. The evaluations take into consideration such factors as changes in the nature and volume of the loan portfolio, overall portfolio quality, review of specific problem loans, and current economic conditions that may affect the borrower's ability to pay.

Nine SBA 504 loans, totaling \$7,437,000, have been approved for disbursement as of June 30, 2020, but no funds have been drawn down on these loans.

Under terms of the loan agreements, E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. is paid a monthly service fee for handling and servicing these loans. E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. has no liability in the event of a default by any of these borrowers.

NOTE I - LONG-TERM DEBT

In October of 2003, E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. received notice from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) that its \$750,000 loan application to establish a five-county regional revolving loan fund was approved. The loan award required local matching funds, which were provided by Business Growth (\$100,000 from its unrestricted fund) and \$17,500 each from the participating counties of Dubuque, Delaware, Jackson, Cedar and Clinton, making the revolving loan fund a total of \$937,500. The full award of \$750,000 was received and the remaining loan balance due to USDA is \$413,858 as of June 30, 2020. The USDA award is a loan and must be repaid over a 30-year period. The loan, dated May 19, 2004, bears interest at 1% per annum. Principal payments were initially deferred for a period of three (3) years. Annual interest payments were required during the deferral period. Amortized annual payments of principal and interest began May 19, 2008.

In April of 2020, E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. received approval for funding for two revolving loan programs from Dubuque Initiatives, the first one for businesses affected by the Covid-19 pandemic, in the amount of \$2,000,000, allowing for loans up to \$10,000 for qualifying businesses. As of June 30, 2020, \$500,000 had been drawn down on this funding, which is recorded as a liability on the books of E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc. A corresponding asset for loans receivable funded by this revolving loan fund totaling \$480,000 is recorded as notes receivable.

Dubuque Initiatives also funded a \$100,000 revolving loan program to assist business negatively impacted by City construction projects in a targeted downtown area. A maximum \$25,000 per business loan is allowed. None of these funds were loaned out before June 30, 2020.

In July 2020, Dubuque County provided \$200,000 to E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc., to establish a revolving loan fund to businesses severely impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic. This program allows for up to \$10,000 loans to businesses located in Dubuque County, but outside the City of Dubuque.

All three of the above loan programs, totaling \$800,000 are recorded as long-term liabilities on the books of E.C.I.A. Business Growth, Inc.

NOTE J - EDA REVOLVING LOAN FUND & EDA RECAPITALIZE REVOLVING LOAN FUND CONSOLIDATON

In April 2009, the U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration (EDA) approved a \$500,000 investment to recapitalize the EDA revolving loan fund administered by ECIA Business Growth, Inc. To obtain this funding the Corporation was required to match with cash contributions of \$150,000 for a total recapitalization of \$650,000. As of April 2016, this loan program has been consolidated with the original EDA revolving loan fund. As of June 30, 2020, all \$1,175,000 has been drawn down on the \$1,175,000 award and all \$400,000 of the required matching contributions have been received.

NOTE K - LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF FINANCIAL ASSETS

The Corporation has financial assets of \$99,997 as of June 30, 2020, consisting entirely of its unrestricted cash and cash equivalents of \$90,200 and accounts receivable-other of \$9,797 available to meet cash needs for general expenditures for the next fiscal year. None of the unrestricted cash amounts are subject to donor or other contractual restrictions that make such assets unavailable for general expenditure within one year of the Statement of Financial Position date.

NOTE L - RISK MANAGEMENT

The Corporation is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft; damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. These risks are covered by the purchase of commercial insurance. Settled claims from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

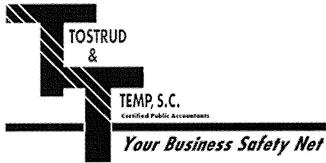
